A message from the Dean...

Hark the glad sound of Advent! It's that time of year to pull out favorite preludes and choir anthems and get in gear for Christmas. Busy, yes. But always an exciting anticipation of a full assembly, beautiful music and dramatic moments. Here are a few random suggestions for celebrating a meaningful Christmas:

1. Practice, practice, practice. No matter how many times you've played that carol or prelude, take a new look at it. Get the fingering right this year. Vary the registration.
2. Treat Choir Members with love. Some give gifts to their choir members but I think heartfelt, thoughtful words of praise and gratitude are even better. A little choir punch at the last rehearsal also helps!
3. Hire a musician. Adding an instrument to the musical lineup always makes the occasion seem special, especially if you can find an unusual instrument or one your congregation does not hear often. This also brings joy to unemployed musicians or experience to high school instrumentalists who have never descanted before.
4. Communicate with your clergyperson. Be sure to let the clergy know if you plan to add an Introit or an

extra anthem. The flow of the service or mass is always smoother if the musicians and the clergy work as an antiphonal team.

5. Get plenty of sleep and slow down the pace. Frantically flying about in a tizzy benefits no one. Carefully tend to the music. Make sure everything is in place ahead of time. Arrive early to give room for last minute glitches. Then get excited, apply some energy and really enjoy the moment as you make the king of instruments sing!
6. When it comes to gift giving, nothing speaks more for your passions than giving the gift of music. Bring your music to Christmas parties and sit down and play. Give CD's to people on your list or music videos to teenagers that are hard to buy for. Sing a lullaby to your grandchild, newborn niece, or aging father. Give someone a harmonica or small penny whistle.
7. Finally, make sure that underneath all this, you talk to God regularly...thankful for the skill of musicianship, in praise for the beauty of this world and in joyous celebration for being here at all. Salary Guidelines for musicians are printed from the wrong year. The current guidelines are included in this issue. Here is the list of "other fees" from the national AGO website.

OTHER FEES

- The range of fees are for musicians with degrees in organ or church music or AGO certification.
- Fees vary regionally. The lowest figures reflect smaller, rural areas of the country.
- Fees will also vary based on training, experience, availability, responsibility, and dates required.

SUBSTITUTE MUSICIANS

- Single service (organist only or director only, no separate rehearsal), \$100-\$225.
- Additional services (organist or director only) not requiring additional preparation, \$50-\$125.
- Single service (organist-director combination, no separate rehearsal), \$150-\$275.
- Additional services (organist-director combination) not requiring additional preparation, \$75-\$175.
- Rehearsal fees range from \$25-\$100/hour, depending on whether the substitute is organist only, director only, or organist-director combination and the preparation required.
- The current, federally approved business standard mileage rate for reimbursement of business travel is charged if visits to church for practice, rehearsal, and service exceed 20 miles per round trip.
- The charge for contracting singers/instrumentalists is \$15-\$35/person hired.

WEDDINGS

- Service fees are \$100-\$350 (service only).
- Wedding rehearsal with bridal party is \$50-\$100/hour.
- Additional rehearsals are \$30-\$50/hour.
- The current, federally approved business standard mileage rate for reimbursement of business travel is charged if visits to church for practice, rehearsal, and service exceed 20 miles per round trip.
- The charge for contracting singers/instrumentalists is \$15-\$35/person hired.

FUNERALS

- Service fees are \$100-\$225 (service only).
- Rehearsals \$25-\$100/hour, depending on the difficulty of the music and the participation of choirs, soloists, or instrumentalists.
- The current, federally approved business standard mileage rate for reimbursement of business travel is charged if visits to church for practice, rehearsal, and service exceed 20 miles per round trip.
